President's Message

Every time I return to Nazareth for a meeting, I look across the lawn and see the windows of the Georgian Room. I remember the good times in the residence halls and some great meals in the Walnut Room (tablecloths and Steak Night!) but the Georgian Room remains one of my favorite memories.

During my era at Nazareth – the mid 1970's - the Georgian Room was used for special events such as receptions, workshops and the annual graduation convocation. What added to the mystery of this special room was the fact that it was usually kept locked. It reminded me of growing up, when my parents used our living room only for "company".

The Georgian Room was also used for many "High Teas" during the 1960's and early 1970's. The all-female student body would gather to hear Sr. Mary Bader, President of Nazareth College, and others speak about the college and the world. Eventually, the teas were discontinued and replaced with guest lecturers addressing the needs of social justice. The backdrop of that beautiful fireplace created from the woods of the Black Forest regions of southern Germany was spectacular.

I think about the times I used this room to do some "all-nighter" studying or typing a term paper that was due within hours of class. We begged the security guard to open up the room as a quiet study center but he was at times hesitant because "the sisters might wonder why the lights were on" if they looked down from their residence on the top floor of the Administration Building.

For the past few years, our Spirit Day luncheon has been held in the Georgian Room. The furniture and that beautiful white area rug are no longer present. We fill the room with banquet tables and chairs but our memories of this room remain.

I loved my years at Nazareth College and whether your memories recall the wide staircase at Nazareth Academy, Alumnae Hall at the motherhouse, the Barbour Hall drill formations, or the hallways of Borgess Hospital, I encourage you to return and recall them at this year's SPIRIT DAY. The theme is "We Remember When..." and in addition to the sisters providing their stories, we will also be telling our stories of laughter, joys, challenges and sorrows.

And as with each memory, I am positive that it ends with a THANK YOU to the Sisters of St. Joseph for giving us the opportunity to experience growth in our academics, social and spiritual foundations. And that spirit continues today with the Nazareth Association.

As president of the Nazareth Association, I want to thank you for your energies, financial support and responses to our appeal letters. With your dollars, we continue to carry forward the mission statement found in the left column. I am most grateful and look forward to personally thanking you at this year's SPIRIT DAY.

Sr. Cathey DeSantis, CSJ reports that the grant request was for the Gratiot Woods neighborhood where the Detroit Catholic Pastoral Alliance works. The residents are “tough” and committed to their community. Many vacant lots in the neighborhood made it difficult to keep the neighborhood clean and well-kept. Members of the block clubs decided that a lawn mower, strong enough to use in the vacant lots, would help tremendously. That’s how the well-received Nazareth Association grant money was spent - to purchase a lawn mower and other tools that neighbors could use to keep vacant properties looking good.

Ministry with Community Grant

The grant was awarded to Ministry with Community through Sr. Maureen Metty, CSJ and Janet Karpus to purchase kitchen equipment used for food preparation to serve the growing numbers of homeless in the Kalamazoo area. This assistance allowed the kitchen staff to improve the quality and diversity of meals making the participants more healthy and energetic. After careful shopping, the staff purchased several items including an electric can opener, a high-priced item that has been significant in saving time and providing safety and cleanliness for staff. Likewise the expensive 60 qt. stainless stockpot replaced a well-used one of much lesser quality and is a better tool for the community’s cooks who prepare many homemade soups, etc. on a regular basis. Other items purchased were new tools to make the job easier or to replace ones that have been broken over time. With this funding, Ministry with Community was able to prepare over 110,000 meals for participants during the year.

Macomb County Warming Center

Sr. Rose Clement Canuelle, CSJ and Kathleen Goodrich received a grant for the Warming Center in Macomb County. The funds are being put to good use for equipment and for people in need. First of all, the center provides a needed place where people are served in various ways with their immediate needs as well as helps for their future, such as job skills training, including interview practice and help with appropriate clothes for interviews. The Center is very grateful for the Nazareth Association grant.

N.E.W. Life Adult Literacy Program, Flint

Sr. Jan Popilek, CSJ received a Nazareth Association Special Needs Grant to help pay for the tests that students take to earn their GED. Eighteen students have achieved their GED and are either enrolled in college or have contracted a job. Some of them are working and going to school. Some have gone on to have very high grade point averages in college. Sr. Jan is pleased to report that several students have come back to help other students study to pass the test. Also, two of our students have been asked to speak to a class at Mott College about how attending GED classes has changed their lives.

Borgess Resounding Spirit Musical Group

Dr. Robert Hill was awarded a grant for the Borgess Resounding Spirit Choir, of which Sr. Paula Terese Pilon, CSJ is a member. The grant money was used mainly for two purposes. The first is to pay for a year-long membership in the Society for the Arts in Healthcare membership. This allows greater access to resources and other grant writing opportunities. The second purpose is to purchase sheet music. The choir uses this music for events such as participation in the Sacred Music Festival. They also hosted a Spring Benefit Concert, held on Friday April 25th at Holy Family Chapel to raise money for Ministry with Community, a local drop-in center for the homeless in Kalamazoo. At this center, people receive meals, and can get showers, do laundry and have other basic needs met, and receive a number of social services to help rebuild their lives. The choir also performs at events for the hospital such as our upcoming Borgess Volunteer Appreciation Dinner in June. The Borgess Resounding Spirit choir mission is to provide restorative support and inspiration to patients, staff and the community. The choir uses the communal experience of singing to provide encouragement and revive the spirit. The choir thanks the Nazareth Association for helping to continue this mission throughout Borgess Health and in the greater Kalamazoo community.

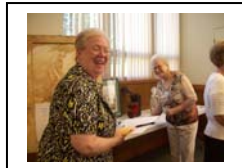

An interview with Olga Bonfiglio

“Where I am today in my life, I owe to Nazareth College!” Olga was Director of Communications at Nazareth College during the late 1970's. Her life was affected by learning the lesson of service to others from John Lore and the college sisters, especially Sr. Irene Waldmann, Srs. Martha and Mary Hallock, and Sr. Rosemary Kenary. Service meant “doing for others, not for your own glory, or more money or power or advancement.” It was at Nazareth that she developed a love for social justice. She remembers the college as a community-minded organization - a "homey" place for learning and living. Everyday life at Nazareth was cooperative rather than competitive.

Once the college was opened to male students, Olga moved into public relations. The new focus was to change the Nazareth College image from a women's college and nursing institution into a college whose programs would also attract male students. Nazareth College designed cutting-edge weekend management programs which did attract male students. During this time, Olga remembers the easy access she had to the Kalamazoo Gazette newsroom because of her predecessor, Sr. De Paul, who had gained the hearts of everyone there at the Gazette office. Sr. DePaul taught us to “be better at what we do.”

In 1995 she received a doctorate in Curriculum and International Education from Western Michigan University and taught at Kalamazoo College and served as Director of the Education Department. She says she was well prepared to be of service to the students by what she learned at Nazareth.

Olga joined the Sisters of St. Joseph for a time and was greatly influenced by Srs. Lois Barror, Rosemary Balog, and Rosemary Tierney. Olga was awarded a Kellogg Fellow Scholarship and had opportunities to travel, a dream of hers. Since then she has traveled to twenty-three countries. Her social justice commitment was strengthened as she learned about the cultures of many peoples.

Olga is a freelance writer recently published in America magazine. In 2005 she published *Heroes of a Different Stripe: How One Town Responded to the War in Iraq*, which includes interviews with many from Kalamazoo. Presently she is working on a book on gardening and meditation. Someone once said to her, “You always bring up the spiritual dimension of things.” Olga agrees and says she learned this from her days at Nazareth. Olga has returned to Nazareth for some of our Spirit Days as “Nazareth is in my heart always.”

“Keep on Learning and Changing”

An interview with Chris Quattrin

Christopher Quattrin, after working with his father in construction, decided to enroll in Nazareth College's Master of Business Management Program in the late 1980's. His mother, Patricia NC'78, may have influenced him, but Christopher notes that this decision has taken him to exciting and fulfilling career opportunities. Among his lasting lessons at Nazareth was to look in the mirror often and note the changes you see. If you don't change, you die. Similarly, if you quit changing in your work, your career will die. So keep on learning so that when opportunities present themselves, you will be ready to act. Another powerful lesson concerned ethical behavior at work. No matter how much it hurts to do the right thing, do it. Quit a position if you have to, rather than compromise your integrity. A third lesson is on automation: computers make automatic the manual process that you map.

Christopher applied these learnings in career opportunities that have taken him across the country. He worked for three years as Manager of Cost Estimation for Kmart, building two hundred stores a year with a one billion dollar budget. Then he spent a number of years for the Smith Group as Chief Estimator in “Design to Cost” projects. These included work at MacNamara Terminal, Ford Field, Tiger Stadium, Detroit Institute of Arts, Michigan State University Bio-Physics Building, Discovery Channel Towers, Detroit Downtown YMCA, St. Jude Hospital and some Detroit schools. He also worked as Cost Engineer for Barton-Marlow working with companies on over-budget solutions. Currently he is working in software development, has created a consulting group for the building of systems, and consults for insurance companies with large-loss claims.

Christopher carries within him the need to remember the people around him and mentor them in the same manner as he was mentored. He tries to help them grow to be the best person they can be. He has helped many people move forward, sometimes helping them decide to enroll in classes or programs. He helps them with their studies and papers and sees them succeed even when they think they can't. “My education at Nazareth College, and from the Jesuits at the University of Detroit, has helped me help many others to be successful.”

Christopher resides in St. Joseph with his three children.

St. Camillus Graduate Around the Globe

An Interview with Mary Durm Mechtenberg

Mary wanted to be a nurse since she was six years old. She entered the Borgess nursing program as part of the St. Camillus unit. It was a three year, year-round program and she graduated in 1960. Memories that stand out for her were the housemother at the door checking students in and out, the tunnel between the nurses' residence and Borgess Hospital, teachers Sister Benedicta and Vera Wallach, and many great friends.

She entered the Sisters of St. Joseph for a time (1960-71), and in 1967, received a B.S. degree from Nazareth College and later in 1972 a Masters in Nursing from Wayne State University. She enjoyed two years of hospital nursing in Mercy Hospital, Monroe and a year or two at Borgess Hospital.

Mary said that she was open to opportunities and inherited a spirit of adventure from her family. In 1968-69, she worked in Vietnam for Catholic Relief Services. She worked to assist refugees with health care problems, taught health care classes at several orphanages, and gave hundreds of immunizations to children to prevent cholera and typhoid. During 2002-2004, she and her husband, Tom Mechtenberg, worked with the Peace Corps. She taught classes on HIV to intermediate and high school students in the West Indies. In 2005, she worked in refugee camps in Sri Lanka following a horrific tsunami, which killed hundreds of thousands of people. She and her husband worked with locals to set up sanitary facilities and organize local camps.

In 2009 and 2012, she and her husband assisted Palestinians in their efforts for peace and justice with Michigan Peace Team. In 2011, she taught HIV classes in Uganda through the Fort Portal Diocese. Currently, she helps with the summer migrant ministry program at migrant camps in Berrien County.

When asked where she got the toughness to do some of these things, she replied that she just took the opportunity to do what she could to make a difference when these opportunities presented themselves - and that she did inherit a spirit of adventure from her family. She has truly made a difference for others around the globe to help create a more just and humane society.

Sister Gabrielle Henning, CSJ

Bernice Henning died January 16, 2014. She was born in St. Johns, MI., on July 1, 1914, the daughter of Frank and Elizabeth (Mueller) Henning. A member of St. Joseph Parish at the time of her entrance into the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph, she received her final vows on January 9, 1939.

Sister Gabrielle earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Piano from Nazareth College, a Master of Arts degree in Education from the Catholic University of America, and a Doctorate in Education from Michigan State University. She began her ministry as a music teacher at Barbour Hall and Nazareth Academy and then she became a full-time faculty member at Nazareth College in the departments of Music and Education, a position which she enjoyed for 44 years. She taught summer classes at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids and the University of Detroit. After retiring from teaching, she continued at Nazareth College as Director of Grants and Accreditation. In retirement at Nazareth Center, she continued to apply for grants and foundation funds to meet specific needs for Nazareth Center and Fontbonne Manor.

Sister Gabrielle taught the students in her education classes, "Those who instruct others unto justice shall shine as stars for all eternity." May she, too, now shine eternally in the presence of the God she served so faithfully.

Memories of the Villa St. Anthony

Villa St. Anthony School for Girls, grades K-6 of Nazareth Academy opened in 1942. It was located in nearby Comstock on East Michigan Avenue, about three miles east of Nazareth. That same year Camp Woodland was opened, a spiritual and recreational 4-week summer camp for young girls ages 5-15. Villa St. Anthony School closed in 1956. Camp Woodland closed in 1962.

Camp Woodland in the 1940's

In the mid 1940's Beverly "Mitzi" Muter Bouvrette, a 4th grade student from the SSJ staffed St. Veronica School in East Detroit, was the only girl from her class who attended the SSJ's summer Camp Woodland at the Villa St. Anthony. Her first time away from home, Mitzi remembers great fun swimming in the large outdoor pool, going down to the river, doing arts and crafts, and meeting lots of girls from different races who all wore navy blue shorts and white tops. She remembers learning manners as a Sister of St. Joseph ate with the girls at each table for every meal. Mitzi says she was grateful for learning how to pick up a glass correctly from the bottom so the chance of germs would be less, and something just as foreign to her -- how to share! When it was time for the girls to leave, some girls were sad as their "home" was the Villa, which Mitzi found out was a residential school. Mitzi's train ride back home to East Detroit all alone was also most memorable.

Sr. Marlene Lammers' Memory of the Villa

Sr. Marlene Lammers, now in her 90's and a resident at Borgess Gardens, remembers her days as a novice, about 1946, in the Sisters of St. Joseph. The bus would bring the class to the Villa, three or four miles from Nazareth, for good times at a picnic. Among other things, she remembers the time the novices went down to the river. A small boat was tied to the shore. Of course, the sisters were told they could not ride in the boat, but three novices got into the boat to just sit. To their surprise, a strong wind came up suddenly, broke the rope, and carried the sisters out into the river. Immediately they were rescued, but from then on, the novices just looked at the boat tied to the shore.

Sisters Celebrate 125th Anniversary of Founding in Kalamazoo

On Sunday, July 6, 2014 the Congregation of St. Joseph at Nazareth will joyfully celebrate the 125th anniversary of their founding in Kalamazoo. It was on July 6, 1889, that Mother Margaret Mary Lacey and nine sisters from Watertown, NY, responded to the call of Father Francis O'Brien, pastor of St. Augustine Church to come and help begin a much needed hospital. The sisters arrived by train and joined with Fr. O'Brien to establish Borgess Hospital to serve the sick in the area. An old mansion in town was purchased and remodeled for hospital rooms, and a convent and chapel for the sisters. The hospital opened in December 1889 with twenty beds and served by eight local physicians.

In the early years in Kalamazoo, the new foundation of Sisters of St. Joseph began their principal works of the congregation. In 1891, the sisters took charge of St. Francis Home for Boys, an orphanage then situated in Monroe, Michigan, but later was housed in Detroit, and began educational ministry at LeFevre Institute, later renamed St. Augustine School. In 1895, the St. Camillus School of Nursing was established at Borgess by Sr. Raphael O'Brien, and subsequently in 1925 became affiliated with Nazareth College. In 1897, the sisters opened Nazareth Academy, a residential school for young women, grades 1-12. In 1902, Barbour Hall opened as a residential school for young boys. In 1924, Nazareth College was incorporated as a four-year liberal arts college for women, but later became coeducational in 1970. St. Joseph School of Nursing in Flint opened in 1958.

Over the years, the institutions of the Sisters of St. Joseph have served thousands of graduates. To this day, the Nazareth Association of alums stands as a tribute to the many that were educated at Nazareth. Thus, on Sunday, July 6, 2014, the 125th anniversary of the Sisters of St. Joseph founding in Kalamazoo will be celebrated at Nazareth, beginning with Mass at 1:00 p.m., and followed by activities and refreshments.
